Introduction



What is the Nevada State Board of Nursing?

It is a seven-member board appointed by the governor consisting of four registered nurses, one practical nurse, one certified nursing assistant and one consumer member. The Board is advised by and appoints members to standing advisory committees. The Board appoints an executive director (a registered nurse), who is responsible for a staff of 19, which regulates a nursing population of more than 37,000.

What does the Nevada State Board of Nursing do?

The state legislature established the Board 86 years ago to regulate the practice of nursing. The scope of the Board's original responsibilities has grown dramatically since 1923, when it licensed 104 registered nurses. In 2008-09, it was responsible for licensing, certifying and disciplining more than 37,000 individuals, including registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, advanced practice nurses, certified nursing assistants, and certified registered nurse anesthetists. The Board's current functions include:

Administration

- Establish minimum practice standards
- Develop and adopt regulations
- Appoint advisory committees to get direct nursing input
- Publish, distribute and provide education on the Nurse Practice Act
- Collaborate with consumers, individuals, groups and organizations
- Provide education to increase public awareness and understanding of the Board's role and purpose

Licensure, Certification and Education

- Approve schools of nursing and nursing assistant training programs
- Adopt exams for licensing/certification
- Issue certificates to nursing assistants
- License registered and practical nurses
- Certify advanced practitioners of nursing, certified registered nurse anesthetists, and emergency medical service/registered nurses

 Approve education/training programs for ongoing competency

Discipline and Investigations

- Investigate complaints against nurses and nursing assistants
- Conduct disciplinary proceedings
- Administer remediation and rehabilitation programs, including:
 - Monitoring nurses and nursing assistants who are on disciplinary probation
 - Administering alternative program for nurses recovering from chemical dependency

A Brief History

In 2009, the Nevada State Board of Nursing (NSBN) completed 86 years of service to the residents of Nevada. Established by the state legislature in 1923, it was modeled on legislation enacted by other countries and a few other states. The intent was to separate untrained "nurses" from those who had undergone formal training.

Nevada's first school of nursing was established by Saint Mary's Hospital in 1909. An alumni association of the school's graduates led the formation of the Nevada State Nurses Association in 1917. Its main objective was to "secure passage of a law providing state registration of nurses."

Attempts to achieve this goal were made during the legislative sessions of 1915, 1919 and 1921, but all failed. In 1923, a bill was introduced by State Assemblywoman Marguerite Gosse of Reno. In spite of opposition, the bill was passed by both houses and signed into law by Governor James Scrugham on March 20, 1923.

Since its inception, the Nevada State Board of Nursing has grown from a three-member to a seven-member entity. Its functions and responsibilities have increased dramatically, as have the number of nursing care providers it oversees.

Over ninety-five individuals have served on the Board, bringing hundreds of years of nursing experience with them. They have represented every nursing specialty and a wide range of health care settings.

In 1973, a consumer member was added to represent the viewpoint of the general public, and in 1995, a certified nursing assistant member was added to represent the CNA community.

Highlights of FY08/09

The Board continues to focus on its public protection mission, while removing unnecessary regulatory barriers and improving services in all areas. Here are a few highlights of FY08/09:

Commitment to Ongoing Regulatory Excellence

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing conducts biannual surveys of boards of nursing, nurses, nursing education programs, and employers of nurses

which measure excellence on quality indicators in nursing regulation, related to five board functions: discipline, practice, education program approval, licensure and governance. The NSBN meansured in the top 10 nursing boards in the nation on most indicators. During 2009, the NSBN was invited to focus groups on a national level to identify best practices in nursing regulation across the nation.

Regulatory changes to remove unnecessary barriers

During the 2009 legislative session, the Board supported two pieces of legislation. One involved certification of medication aides for administering medication in long term and skilled care facilities in Nevada. The legislation never got out of its first committee. The Board supported another bill to ensure whistle-blower protection for nurses, physicians, and other healthcare providers which passed near the end of the session.

There was interest in allowing nurses who meet all other requirements for licensure to be awarded a "Volunteer" license. The Board approved an internal policy to issue a "Volunteer" license and waive the licensure fee, allowing nurses who attest that their practice will be limited to gratuitous nursing in times of natural or manmade disasters for an organized relief organization or in matters of public health such as immunization centers, public health clinics, or indigent clinics.

The Board's Involvement in Research and National Healthcare Policy

In May, 2009, the Board and partners, University of Nevada, Las Vegas and Spring Valley Hospital, completed a study on how international graduates of nursing schools might benefit from an interventional program to address language, culture, and institutional knowledge barriers to nursing practice in the U.S. Formal results will be available in the Fall of 2009.

Board members and staff are extensively involved in representing Nevada at a national level in their work with the National Council of State Boards of Nursing (NCSBN). The purpose of the NCSBN is to provide an organization through which boards of nursing act and

counsel together on matters of common interest and concern affecting the public health, safety and welfare, including the development of licensing examinations in nursing. Representatives from the NSBN serve as the chair of the Continued Competence Committee, a member of the Institute of Regulatory Excellence Committee, the Delegate Assembly Resolutions Committee, and the Disciplinary Resources Task Force. For the upcoming year, the Board's executive director will serve on the NCSBN Board of Directors.

Technology Innovations Reduce the Board's Carbon Footprint

The Board has initiated practices within its two office sites to respect the environment and increase efficiency. The Board invested in a document scanning and imaging system which allows the elimination of paper whenever possible. Paperless Board meetings and advisory committee meetings have replaced face-toface meetings by utilizing videoconferencing capabilities between our Reno and Las Vegas office sites. This has decreased paper costs as well as travel costs, not to mention time and productivity for Board members, staff, and committee members. Online renewal of licensure and certification is available to all individuals whom the Board regulates, eliminated postage, paper, and increased staff productivity. Off site storage has been decreased by scanning and shredding the paper documents, while still meeting document retention requirements.

Approval of New Nursing Education Programs

The Board continues to receive inquiries from nursing education programs across the nation interested in applying for Board approval.

The Board has approved two new nursing programs during this fiscal year: Kaplan LPN program and Apollo College, Reno. The number of fully approved nursing programs in Nevada has increased from six to eight, with Nevada State College and Touro University both advancing from provisional approval to full approval by meeting the required 80% first time pass rate for the national nursing exam, NCLEX.

The Board also approved one new certified nursing assistant program. Currently there are 18 approved certified nursing assistant programs throughout the state,

located in community colleges, nursing facilities and high schools. The Board also hosted its first faculty education day for nursing assistant instructors.

Enhancement of the Board's Alternative Program for Chemically Dependent Nurses

The goal of the Board's Alternative Program for Chemically Dependent Nurses is to protect the public by identifying impaired nurses and certified nursing assistants, providing intervention and education, and requiring treatment. Under the authority of NRS 632.307, the Board monitors licensees through a structured program which includes a period of voluntary surrender of their license, intensive treatment, and return to work under a very stringent 5-year monitoring agreement. Impaired nurses who are interested in entering this program must meet very specific eligibility criteria. During this fiscal year, the Board broadened the eligibility requirements to encourage nurses to enter the program during preliminary investigation of misconduct related to controlled substances, thus more quickly removing the nurses from practice. In support of the Board's mission to protect the public, removing nurses from practice while requiring entry into treatment and long term monitoring provides public safety and support for nurses with the disease of chemical dependency.


Establishing and maintaining stakeholder relationships

Consumer and provider education is key to establishing and maintaining stakeholder relationships. Board members and staff provided nearly 100 presentations to consumers, nurses, nursing students, and other healthcare professionals during the last fiscal year. A clear understanding of the Board's mission and the processes it utilizes to meet that mission fosters trust and collaboration among stakeholders. The Board continues to host the Health Professions Council, made up of the larger health professions' boards, which meets at least quarterly to address common interests in healthcare regulation. The Board works closely with the Nevada Nurses Association and other professional nursing groups to promote effective communication for improving patient safety in Nevada.




Five-Year Comparison of Total Active Licenses and Certificates Holders

Five-Year Comparison of Graduates from Nevada Nursing Programs






Five-Year Comparison of RN/LPN Complaints Opened

To obtain full approval, they must gain national accreditation (which they cannot do until after their first class is graduated), and they must achieve a first-time pass rate of 80 percent or higher on the NCLEX (an annual average). If individuals graduate from a school that has provisional rather than full approval, they are eligible for Nevada licensure.

Investigation Statistics



If the Nevada State Board of Nursing receives information that a nurse or nursing assistant may have broken the law (the Nevada Nurse Practice Act), the Board has the authority to investigate. It will only investigate if the complaint is received in writing, names a nurse or nursing assistant who is licensed or certified in the state of Nevada, is signed by the person making the complaint, and alleges a violation of the Nurse Practice Act. Investigations are also generated from nurses and nursing assistants who answer "yes" to one or more of the five screening questions asked on initial and renewal applications for licensure/certification.

Before disciplinary action is taken, the Board ensures the nurse or nursing assistant is given due process, which requires giving adequate notice and description of the charges, and a hearing or the opportunity for a hearing. The individual also has the right to a formal hearing, the right to an attorney, the right to not participate in an informal hearing, the right to not sign anything, the right to see the complaint, and the right to appeal.

If the evidence doesn't support the allegations, the complaint may be dismissed or closed. If the evidence does support the allegations, the Board may take disciplinary action against the individual. If the investigation is generated from an answer to the application screening questions, depending upon the nature of the "yes" answer and the evidence received, the application may cleared without disciplinary action or heard by the Baord for final disposition, up to and including disciplinary action.

The disciplinary penalty is determined based on a number of factors which include the severity and recency of the offense, extent of patient harm, degree of deviation from standard practice, evidence of rehabilitation, current ability to practice safely, mitigating or aggravating factors, and past disciplinary history.

Disciplinary action can include denial, reprimand, fine, suspension, probation, voluntary surrender, or revocation of a license or certificate and may include requirements such as continuing education or drug testing. The Board considers each case individually.

FY08-09 Probation Statistics When considering what kind of disciplinary action it should take, the Board always asks itself, "What is needed to make this person safe to practice?" The answer depends on the nature of the violation. In many cases, the Board places individuals on disciplinary probation so that it can restrict, monitor and improve the person's practice. The Board also has a very successful alternative monitoring program that allows qualified, chemically dependent nurses and nursing assistants to re-enter the workforce in a paced sequence. It also monitors their recovery to ensure the safety of their patients. The statistics below include all people who were on probation as of June 30, 2008.

Board Advisory Committees

The Board is advised by and appoints members to standing advisory committees. These committees are composed of nursing professionals who are chosen based on expertise, geographic location and committee need.

Questions about nursing regulation and practice are brought to these committees for research, discussion and policy development. The Board considers the recommendations of its advisory committees during its regular meetings. Virtually every law, regulation and advisory opinion issued by the Board has been based on a recommendation by one of its advisory committees.

Committee openings are advertised in the Board's news magazine and on its website. Applications are reviewed and members are appointed at regularly scheduled Board meetings. One Board member serves as a liaison to each advisory committee; Board staff members serve as advisory committee chairs.

Advanced Practice Advisory Committee

The Advanced Practice Advisory Committee advises and reports to the Board on matters related to the practice of advanced practitioners of nursing. It consists of not more than seven persons who are knowledgeable in areas concerning APN practice.

In FY08/09, the committee reviewed the Consensus Model for APRN Regulation:

Licensure, Accreditation, Certification & Education which was completed in July, 2008, through the work of the APRN Consensus Work Group and the National Council of State Boards of Nursing APRN Advisory Committee. The committee highlighted the need for Nevada to begin requiring national certification for APNs to ensure competence. The committee also proposed an advisory opinion that clarifies the role of the APN in Nevada while working within the Veterans Administration system.

It also monitors recovery progress through scheduled interviews with the nurse or nursing assistant and through regular reports from employers and treatment providers.

The committee also makes recommendations to the Board regarding application and/or reinstatement of licensure/certification, and termination of probation.

The entire committee meets semiannually to review the monitoring process, conceptual model, and provider status; plan educational presentations; and formulate proposals for policy and procedural changes to the Board. Representatives of the committee meet monthly in Reno and Las Vegas.

In FY08/09, the committee evaluated 221 individuals.

Nursing Practice Advisory Committee
